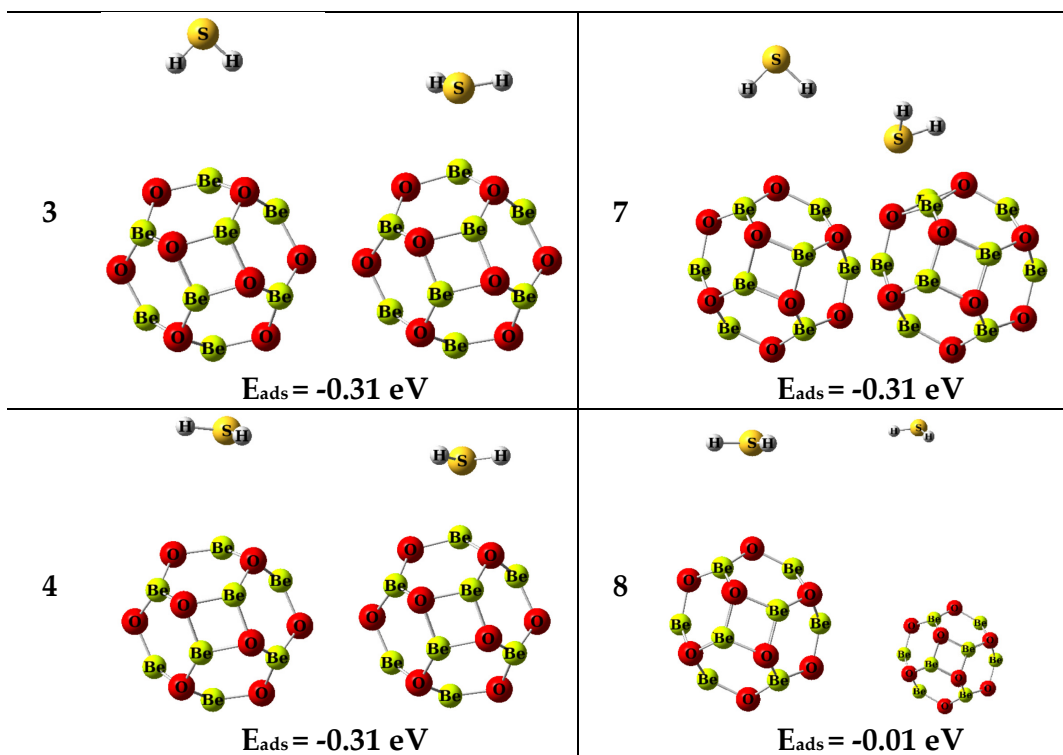
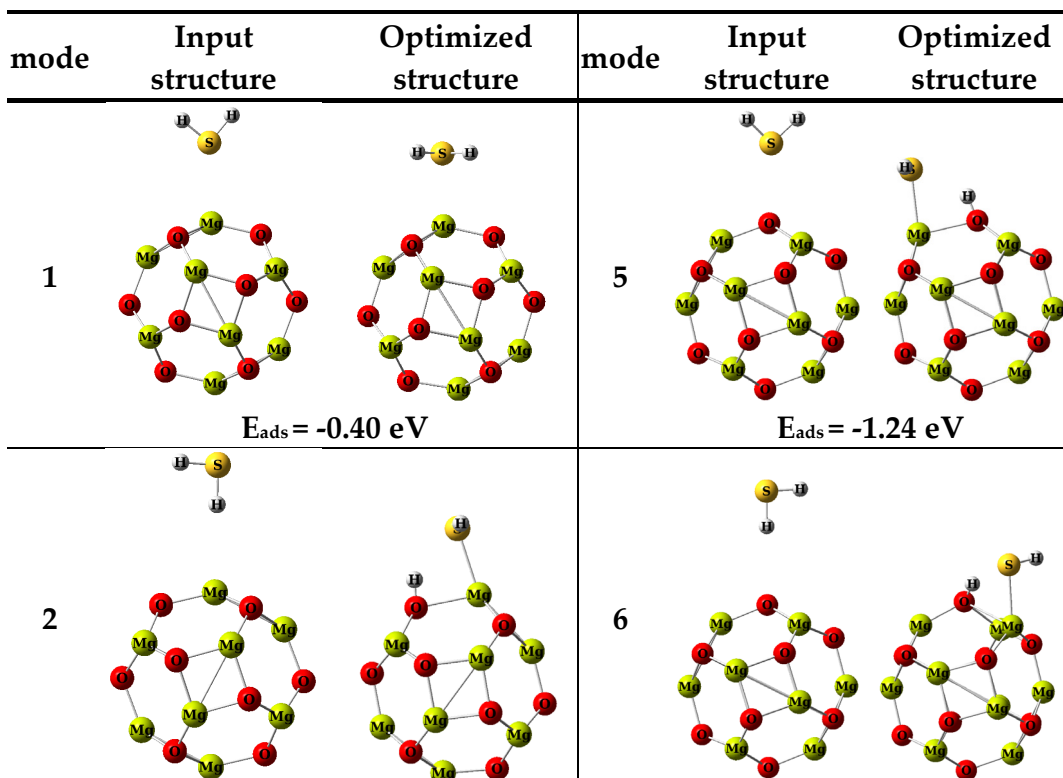


Table S2. The examined orientations for H₂S interaction with Mg₁₂O₁₂.



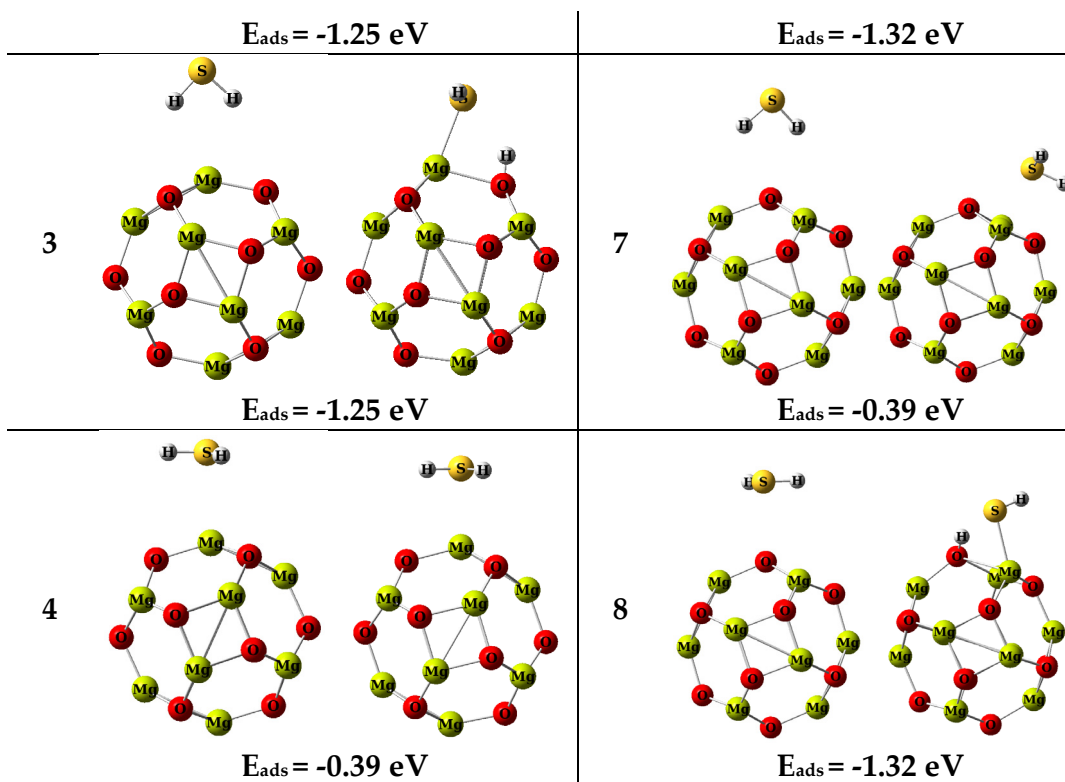
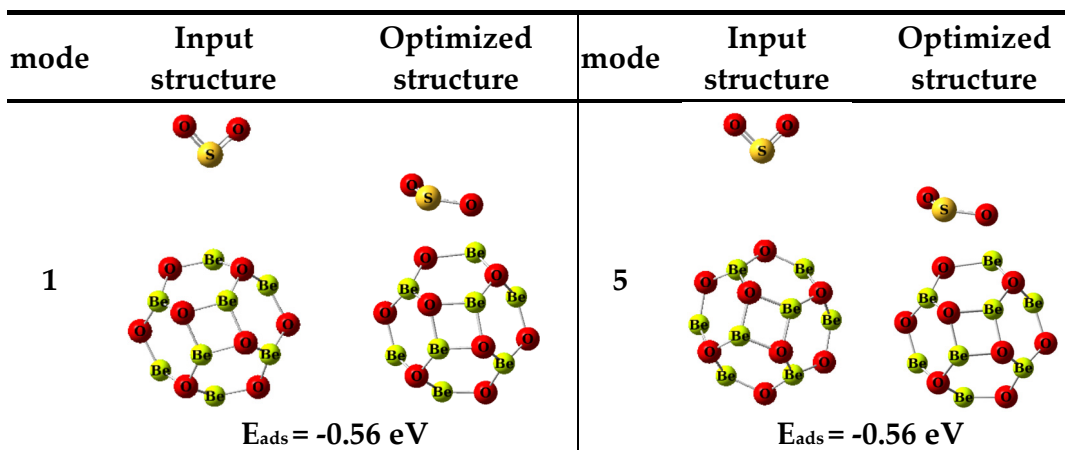


Table S3. The examined orientations for SO_2 interaction with $\text{Be}_{12}\text{O}_{12}$.



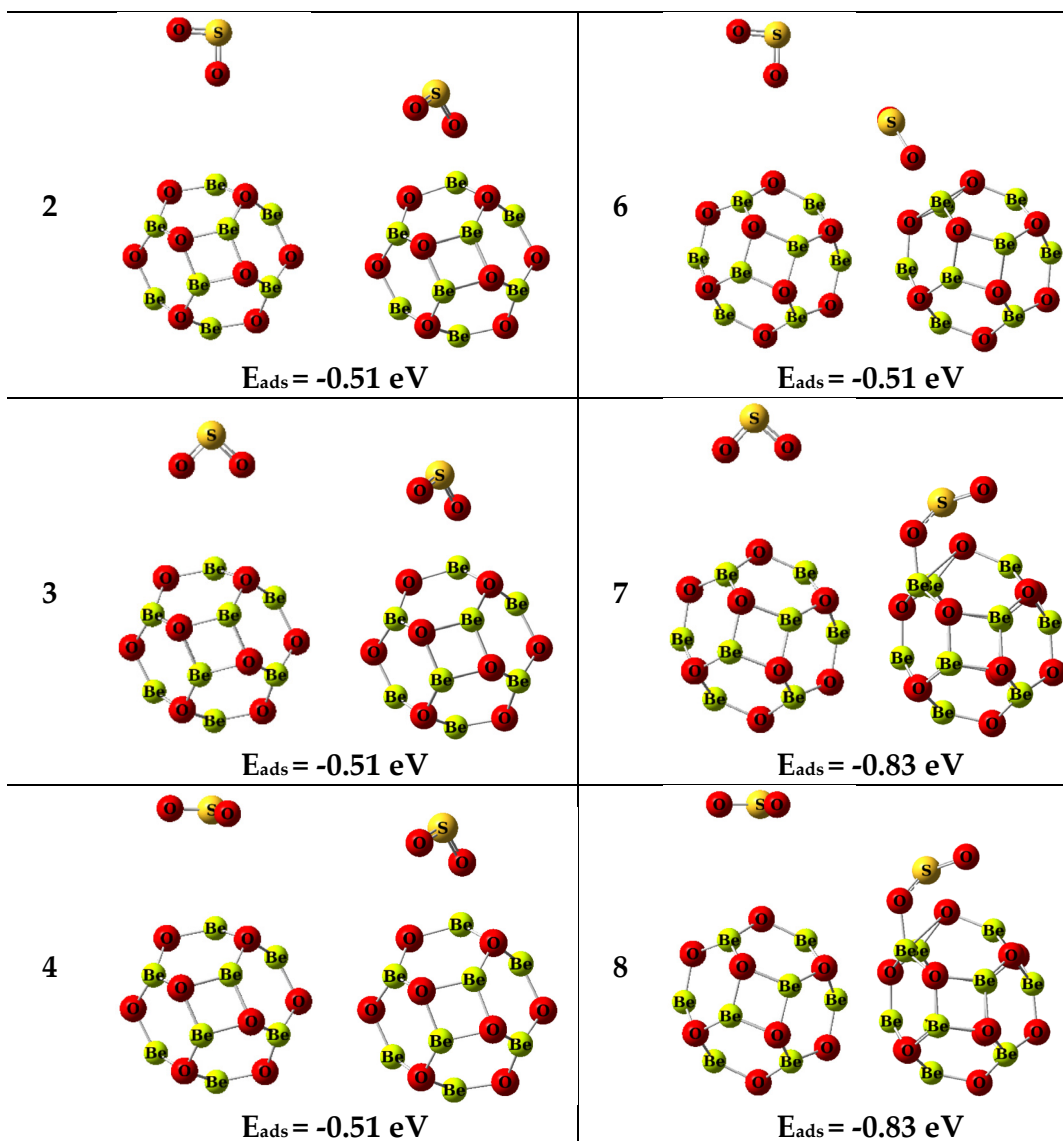
