Message from the Guest Editor

Inflammation is an adaptive response triggered by noxious stimuli and conditions such as infection and tissue injury. Numerous phytochemicals with peculiar reducing properties have been recently shown to modulate the inflammatory response effectively. First considered 'health-promoting' by virtue of their radical-scavenging activity and/or direct antioxidant effects on cellular biomolecules, such compounds are now believed to be able to interfere with cell signal transduction by intercepting reactive species at the level of critical signalling pathways. In addition, the interaction of these molecules with signalling enzymes, receptors and transcription factors has emerged recently. Contributions are invited from investigators worldwide in the form of reviews or original research articles on the anti-oxidative and anti-inflammatory effects and mechanisms exerted by plant extracts in vitro and in vivo.
