# Variability and Predictability of Space Weather and the Ionosphere: Recent Advances

### Message from the Guest Editor

Studying complex systems such as Space Weather and the Ionosphere is relevant to understanding the physical processes involved (Knowledge) and society's use of such systems (Applications). New approaches, including the chaotic description of such systems and the development of advanced machine learning algorithms, make it possible to advance in the ability to model and predict the time evolution of their variables.
