Clouds are composed of liquid water droplets, ice crystals or a mixture of the two. Clouds with mixtures of ice particles and cloud droplets also occur. Clouds are inherently inhomogeneous media with inhomogeneity both in the vertical and horizontal directions. Therefore, theoretical studies on radiation transport in clouds (e.g., clouds of various shapes) are performed using the 3D radiative transfer theory. Accounting for 3D effects and cloud vertical inhomogeneity is critical in modern cloud remote sensing. This Special Issue is focused on the latest developments in cloud remote sensing. We therefore invite papers on the following areas:

- Ground-based cloud remote sensing;
- Satellite cloud remote sensing;
- Airborne cloud remote sensing;
- Remote sensing of clouds using optical and thermal infrared techniques;
- Microwave remote sensing of clouds;
- Multi-angular cloud polarimetry;
- Radiative transfer in clouds;
- Light scattering by ice crystals and mixed-phase clouds;
- Radiative properties of polluted and mixed phase clouds;
- Radiative properties of hurricanes.
