# C and N Cycling and Greenhouse Gases Emission in Agroecosystem

## Message from the Guest Editor

The agriculture sector is an important source of greenhouse gas (CO2, CH4 and N2O) emissions to the atmosphere. These emissions are caused by agricultural management practices, including landuse change, tillage, harvest, slash and burn, application of chemical fertilizer and manure, irrigation and drainage, grazing and animal husbandry, which influence C and N cycling in agroecosystems. An agroecosystem is, not only present as an ecosystem under agricultural management, but also connected to other ecosystems, including natural ecosystems. Studies on the relationship between microbial activities (aerobic and anaerobic organic matter decomposition, nitrification and denitrification) and climate factors (temperature, precipitation, humidity, etc.) and soil environmental factors (soil temperature, soil moisture, groundwater level, soil pH, SOC, SON, mineral nitrogen, water soluble organic carbon, etc.) are also important to parameterization for simulation models. I would like to invite all of you, studying C and N cycling and greenhouse gas emissions in agroecosystems, to contribute your papers to this Special Issue.<
