I welcome manuscripts describing results from MRI and EEG studies of decision-making under uncertainty in psychotic illness, factors driving set-shifting vs. set maintenance, the exploration/exploitation trade-off, cost/benefit decision-making, or related topics. Studies examining neural and psychological processes underlying decision-making as potential treatment targets would be of interest, as well.
