Message from the Guest Editors

Accurate stellar evolution modeling is only possible once the correct stellar structures have been constructed. While many papers and books on stellar evolution have been published over the decades, we feel a comprehensive volume describing the physics and state of the art of stellar structures over the stellar mass range is missing. Stars of different masses and ages have different internal structures. The differences in these structures result in different luminosities, classifications and evolutions. The development of asteroseismology has given us a deeper understanding of the internal structures of stars. In addition, the study of physics such as nuclear reactions and chemicals and angular momentum transport inside stars helps us understand the basic physical properties of stars across the HR diagram. This topic will focus on the internal structure of stars, especially on the main sequence, which will help understand the evolution of all stages from birth to death as white dwarfs, neutron stars and black holes.
