In recent years, advanced design methodologies and characterisation techniques (spectroscopic, microscopic, scattering, and material testing) have broadened our understanding of the relationship between the structure and rheological properties of plant biopolymers. The biopolymers' natures, their gelling mechanisms and design principles determine the structural, rheological and mechanical properties of food gels; with implications for food manufacturability, food texture, product stability, nutritional properties and the targeted delivery of bioactives in the gastrointestinal tract. Emerging approaches in the advanced design and characterisation techniques of gels may improve our utilisation of plant-based resources and establish new health and industrial applications for food gels.
