Message from the Guest Editor

This Special Issue of Geosciences aims to gather highquality original research articles, reviews, and technical notes on the topic of precursory phenomena that occur prior to earthquakes. Several types of emissions are detected prior to earthquakes, which provide a potential data source from which seismic predictions can be made. Recent research suggests that specific preseismic activity can be directly related to specific earthquakes, although this is still an open issue. It is still unclear how pre-seismic emissions and subsequent earthquake events can be linked with accuracy. The problem of earthquake prediction is a significant challenge among the scientific community, with several reported attempts to resolve issues related to the discovery of credible and unambiguous pre-earthquake precursors, especially for strong and catastrophic earthquakes. For the above reasons, I would like to invite you to submit recent articles, experimental research papers, and case studies, with respect to the topics described above. Papers on the interconnection of the above topics are strongly encouraged.
