Edible coatings, active packaging (antioxidants and antimicrobials), irradiation, gaseous ozone and good management practices are among the postharvest techniques used; however, these are under constant research due to their importance in helping reduce waste and improve the quality of crops. The purpose of this Special Issue aims to present updated information on emerging technologies for packaging and postharvest conservation techniques. Articles with innovative techniques to improve the shelf-life and/or maintain the quality of fruits, vegetables, seeds and grains are welcome in this Special Issue.
