The majority of mathematical descriptions reported in the literature are objective. However, there are also descriptions that are nonobjective. For example, descriptions that use Caputo or Riemann-Liouville fractional order derivatives, have integral representation on a finite interval, and describe a constitutive law, elastic phenomena, wave propagation, fluid flow, or molecular diffusion are nonobjective. The goal of this Special Issue is to publish contributions revealing nonobjective mathematical descriptions in mechanics and explaining how the reported results have to be interpreted by the reader.
