# Membranes for Carbon Dioxide Separation

### Message from the Guest Editor

Climate change mitigation, in the short and long term, makes necessary the development of alternative approaches in energy-related processes. In this context, membrane operations for CO<sub>2</sub> separation are intensively being explored due to the fundamental engineering and economic advantages over conventional industrial processes. In line with the increasing attention that membranes have gained in the last few decades, the present Special Issue reports on the most important and latest fundamental and technological advances in CO<sub>2</sub> separation processes using membranes under the three main approaches under study: i) sieve membranes, ii) non-dispersive absorption using porous membranes; and (iii) supported liquid membranes. This Special Issue, "Membranes for Carbon Dioxide Separation", is open to manuscripts focused on polymeric, inorganic and mixed matrix membranes, as well as CO<sub>2</sub>-facilitated transport membranes and hollow fiber gas-liquid membrane contactors.

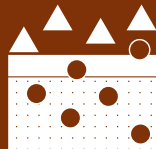
