Molecular Epidemiology and Surveillance of Enteric Viruses

Message from the Guest Editors

Enteric viruses are a functional rather than a taxonomic group, sharing some common characteristics. Primarily, the transmission of enteric viruses occurs through the fecal–oral route, although direct transmission also occurs through person-to-person contact. Enteric viruses are a significant cause of foodborne diseases through contaminated food or water or contaminated surfaces (fomites). The aim of this Special Issue is to focus on the emergence and spread of common and novel viruses; the effectiveness of diagnostic approaches; genotyping, evolutionary mechanisms, natural selection and escape to immunity; and the implementation of infection control measures and treatment. Research studies on viral AGE, encompassing basic virology, molecular epidemiology, surveillance and prevention measures, etc., are encouraged to be submitted to this Special Issue. Any manuscripts that are relevant to “Viral Gastroenteritis and Enteric Viruses” are welcome.
